



Voter Identification Requirements

Electors must provide identification to vote. There are two options for meeting the voter ID requirements in Alberta:

Option 1: Name on the Permanent Electors Register (PER)

One piece of ID issued by a Canadian government (federal, provincial, or local, or an agency) that contains a photograph of the person (i.e., a driver's license, an Alberta ID card, or a Canadian passport).

Option 2: Name not on the PER, no government-issued photo ID, or address is different:

Must complete Form 13 (Elector Register) and provide one of the following:

- One piece of identification issued by a Canadian government, whether federal, provincial or local, or an agency of that government, that contains a photograph of the person, the person's name and the address of the person's residence; OR
- One piece of identification from the list below that contains the person's name and current address; OR
- One piece of identification from the list below that contains the person's name and an eligible voter to vouch, who meets the requirements below and completes a Statement of Voucher Form.

Examples of Acceptable ID

Government-issued documents <ul style="list-style-type: none">• Alberta driver's licence or ID card (AISH, Canadian Forces, etc.).• Alberta Health Care Card• Canadian Passport• Certificate of Indian Status• Fishing, trapping, or hunting licence.• Government cheque or cheque stub.• Income/property tax assessment notice.• Letter from a public curator, public guardian or public trustee.• Statement of government benefits (e.g., employment insurance, old-age security, social assistance, disability support or child tax benefits).	Other documents <ul style="list-style-type: none">• Bank/credit card statement or personal cheque.• Insurance policy or coverage card.• Pension Plan statement of benefits, contributions or participation.• Residential lease or mortgage statement.• Utility bill (e.g. telephone, public utilities commission, television, hydro (electric), gas or water).• Vehicle ownership, registration or insurance certificate.• Library Card• Métis Nation or Métis Settlement Membership Card• Any other piece of identification authorized by the Chief Electoral Officer that contains both name and address.
School, college or university documents <ul style="list-style-type: none">• Correspondence issued by a school, college or university.	Attestation form <p>Attestation forms are authorized to be used as a form of identification in the following circumstances:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• A voter who resides in a supportive living or long-term care facility.• A voter who resides in student housing on a campus.• A voter who is an inmate.• A voter who receives services from a shelter or community support centre.• A voter who is renting their ordinary residence.
